The 113th Tour de France will pass through the northern part of the Costa Daurada for the first time. The world's most prestigious and widely watched cycling race will begin on 4 July 2026 from iconic Montjuïc hill in Barcelona.

The next day, the Costa Daurada will take the spotlight. The stage begins in Tarragona and covers 178 kilometres, 36 of which will trace Tarragona's stunning coastline along a route that seamlessly brings sport, culture, and heritage together in a unique Mediterranean setting.

In Tarragona, the race will set off from Parc Francolí and head towards the Rambla Nova and the Balcó del Mediterrani, very close to UNESCO World Heritage monuments such as the Roman amphitheatre and the Roman circus.

The cyclists will then continue through the towns of Altafulla, La Riera de Gaià, La Pobla de Montornès, and, lastly, Torredembarra with its impressive lighthouse and Els Muntanyans Beach.

The stage will then follow the coast near Creixell and then Roda de Berà with its stately arch, which presides over the historic Via Augusta. Moving on, the route will pass through the town of El Vendrell, home to the Pau Casals Museum. From there, the cyclists will pass through the town of Calafell, dominated by its castle and Iberian citadel, bidding farewell to the Costa Daurada on the seashore in Cunit before setting off towards Barcelona.



Tarragona to Barcelona: 178.4 km

Tarragona, a city of 136,000 inhabitants with a remarkable archaeological ensemble recognised as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, will host the start of a stage. The first section will follow a spectacular coastal route, which is completely flat and passes through renowned seaside resorts such as Sitges, known as the 'Spanish Saint-Tropez'. It will then follow a long stretch of coastline with beautiful sea views. The second part of the stage is more rugged and demanding. After entering Barcelona, the route leads to a final circuit through a green zone dominated by a challenging climb to Montjuïc Castle of 1.6 km, including a 600 m section with a 13% gradient, which must be tackled three times. The stage concludes with an uphill finish, the same as the one in the team time trial the previous day.

The most Mediterranean 36 kilometres of the Costa Daurada

Tarragona

Parc Francolí will be the starting point, leading onto the Rambla, a broad promenade of almost two kilometres that connects the city's more modern section with the Part Alta, the historic centre, before culminating at the Balcó del Mediterrani, a renowned viewpoint offering sweeping sea views. From there, the cyclists will pass only metres from the Roman amphitheatre and Roman circus, where almost two millennia ago chariot and quadriga races thrilled the citizens of Tarraco.

Altafulla

A walled town that radiates charm. Its narrow streets and 18th-century houses evoke a bygone era, revealing one of the most captivating and authentic spots on the Costa Daurada.

La Riera de Gaià

Surrounded by farmland, La Riera de Gaià is home to several small villages, such as mediaeval Virgili and Ardenya.

Torredembarra

The tallest lighthouse in Catalonia stands near the sea in Torredembarra, at a height of 38 metres reached by climbing 217 steps to the lantern room at the top. This iconic landmark is an unmistakable symbol of the coastline.

La Pobla de Montornès

The Baroque-style chapel of Santa Maria, with mediaeval roots, overlooks the village of La Pobla de Montornès from atop a neighbouring hill.

Creixell

The town of Creixell features a great lookout point at the easternmost end of the Costa Daurada and more than two kilometres of beaches.

Roda de Berà

The Arc de Berà on the Via Augusta stands as a true symbol of the region's rich Roman heritage. Built at the end of the 1st century BC, the arch was erected as a tribute to Emperor Caesar Augustus, who lived on the Costa Daurada.

El Vendrell

The hometown of Pau Casals, considered one of the greatest cellists in history, houses the museum dedicated to his life and work.

Calafell

The Iberian Citadel (La Ciutadella Ibèrica), dating from the 6th century BC, opens a window to history with its fortified enclosure set against the sea.

Cunit

The final stretch of the Tour round Costa Daurada will take you through Cunit, which features a nearly 3km-long seafront promenade, a unique setting for enjoying the sea.

Tarragona

The city that captivated the Romans

The Romans christened Tarraco the 'city of eternal spring' and it still retains that charm today. Tarragona is a magical place, bathed in a unique light that brings out the beauty of its UNESCO World Heritage monuments, including the Roman amphitheatre, the Roman circus, the ancient city walls, the Ferreres aqueduct, and many more remarkable sites. These architectural jewels transport you back to the city of Caesar Augustus, who was captivated by it and made it his home for two years.

But Tarragona is much more than history; it is a place where the natural beauty of the sea and the land come together in perfect harmony. Fifteen kilometres of coastline and ten beaches invite you to dive into its warm, crystal-clear waters. And if you prefer walking or cycling, the city offers more than 75 kilometres of signposted paths. Scenic routes like the Camí de Ronda and the Camí de la Costa wind through landscapes where rich heritage blends with the sparkling Mediterranean.

Tarragona is also a city of festivals and culture. Its calendar is packed with exciting events and traditions like the Sant Magi festival in August, the Santa Tecla festival in September, and the breathtaking Concurs de Castells, the world's most important human castle event, in October 2026.

Did you know...?

Tarraco's Roman circus was 325 metres long and 115 metres wide and could hold up to 30,000 spectators.

Tarragona is the city of romesco sauce, the perfect complement for the exquisite seafood of the Costa Daurada. Enjoying a meal at any of Tarragona's restaurants is a genuine treat for the senses.



Altafulla

A mediaeval paradise by the sea on the Costa Daurada

Visiting the walled town of Altafulla is like travelling back in time. Its cobbled streets and castle, built in the Middle Ages, evoke a time when it was a frontier territory. Today, the fortress overlooks its historic centre brimming with peace and charm, where houses look out over the Mediterranean.

The seafront surprises visitors with its old *botigues* (shops) and whitewashed fishermen's houses, offering a unique postcard view of the Costa Daurada. A few metres away, its beach—a kilometre of fine golden sand—invites you to swim in calm crystal-clear waters. Its natural beauty is equally remarkable, with a path that follows the coast (the Camí de Ronda), revealing one-of-a-kind spots where history and nature blend seamlessly.

A must-see is the Roman villa of Els Munts, one of the best-preserved villas in Spain, a testament to the Roman aristocracy's fondness for this part of the Costa Daurada.



Let the good times roll!

A visit to Altafulla is also an opportunity to savour exceptional cuisine in the walled district, where restaurants exude both history and elegance. Altafulla also offers innovative gastropubs. Seafood dishes made with locally-sourced 'zero-kilometre (km0)' products can be found on the seafront promenade.

Did you know...?

The Roman emperor Hadrian visited Tarraco between 122 and 123 AD. He is thought to have stayed at the Roman villa of Els Munts, where a statue of his beloved companion Antinous still stands.

La Riera de Gaià

A rural gem on the Costa Daurada among fields and forests



Set amidst farmland and Mediterranean forests, the small village of La Riera de Gaià is a place where nature and history coexist in perfect harmony. Agriculture remains an important part of life here, while the peaceful surroundings are accentuated by the nearby River Gaià and quaint villages.

In the centre of La Riera de Gaià stands the Baroque church of Santa Margarida. And don't miss out on the remains of Castellot, the ancient fortress of the lords of Montoliu, strategically located very close to the river. The circular tower still stands today, silently watching the passage of time.

La Riera de Gaià serves as the gateway to trails leading to the quaint villages of Ardenya and Virgili, where the true spirit of the Costa Daurada can be discovered on foot or by bike.

Did you know...?

Ardenya and Virgili, part of the municipality of La Riera de Gaià, remain a well-kept secret for those seeking tranquillity and authenticity on the Costa Daurada—a region that famously captured the heart of filmmaker Bigas Luna.

The Mediterranean cuisine offered in the restaurants of La Riera includes delicious traditional dishes such as rabbit stews, *cargols* (escargot), and other specialities that captivate lovers of authentic, time-honoured cooking.



La Pobla de Montornès

A natural treasure between the sea and the mountains of the Costa Daurada

La Pobla de Montornès is a small oasis that combines nature, history and authenticity. Its historic centre retains its rural charm, with narrow streets and stone houses and the Baroque church of Santa Maria as its centrepiece.

Exploring La Pobla by bicycle or on foot takes you along country paths framed by vineyards and Mediterranean woodlands. A perfect route is the ascent to Pic de la Mola, the highest point in the municipality, from where you can enjoy a 360° panoramic view of the sea and mountains of the Costa Daurada.

At the top of a hill, you'll find the Montornès chapel, another of its treasures. Accessible by foot or bicycle, the surrounding area features a picnic spot that invites visitors to pause, relax, and take in the scenery.

Walk along the rural paths and discover huts made with dry stone construction techniques and traditional farmhouses such as El Soler, which stand as testimony to the municipality's rich heritage.

Did you know...?

Every Christmas for nearly 50 years, the townspeople of La Pobla de Montornès have put on a live nativity scene.

Torredembarra

Natural beauty and cultural heritage in the heart of the Costa Daurada

Torredembarra, one of the historic towns of the Costa Daurada, combines a rich past with remarkable natural beauty. The historic centre radiates history, with highlights such as the Plaça de la Vila and castle—now the town hall—the narrow streets in the 17th-century walled enclosure, and the well-preserved gateways. Additionally, the legacy of the *indianos* (people who returned home after making their fortunes in the Americas) is spectacular, especially along Antoni Roig Street.

And nature plays a leading role, with 17 signposted routes you can follow on foot or by bicycle to discover its picturesque landscapes at your leisure. On the coast, the Platja dels Muntanyans is home to a unique ecosystem of dunes and brackish marshes, a true treasure of which few remain on the Catalan coastline.

The seaside neighbourhood of Baix a Mar retains its charm: whitewashed fishermen's houses, some Catalan modernist buildings, and restaurants where you can enjoy fresh seafood and traditional cuisine—a genuine reflection of the real Costa Daurada.

Savour the cuisine of the sea and the mountains in a unique fusion where the freshest seafood is fused with the flavours of the land in traditional dishes and innovative creations.

Did you know...?

The Torredembarra lighthouse was inaugurated on 1 January 2000 and was designed by architect Josep Maria Llinàs.

Creixell

A haven of tranquillity on the Costa Daurada



Just over two kilometres of fine sandy beaches, caressed by warm, shallow Mediterranean waters, are among the main attractions of the town of Creixell, a peaceful spot in the north of the Costa Daurada that is perfect for couples and families.

Its historic centre embodies the Middle Ages, featuring narrow cobbled streets, an 11th-century castle, the town walls, the Torre de Ca la Miquelina and more. The bell tower of the church of Sant Jaume stands tall, nearly 50 metres high, topped with a Catalan modernist spire designed by Josep Maria Jujol.

Rural roads and trails surrounded by forests and ecologically rich wetlands beckon you to explore the area. The Baix Gaià area is also home to a wide variety of bird life. It's a perfect place to relax and enjoy the Costa Daurada's calm.

Did you know...?

Creixell boasts a magnificent white sand beach with shallow, crystal-clear waters stretching almost two kilometres and including Creixell Beach and the Gorg, an enchanting protected natural area.

Let the good times roll!

Creixell's restaurants fill their kitchens with seasonal and local products, everything from fish and rice to *cargols* (escargot) and *calçots* (spring onions), all paired perfectly with DO Tarragona wines.

Roda de Berà

In the heart of the Via Augusta
a on the Costa Daurada

Roda de Berà holds a living reminder of the Roman Empire. The Arc de Berà, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, once marked the grand entrance on the Via Augusta, connecting Hispania to the Italian peninsula.

It still stands as a testament to Tarraco's former glory and the passage of time.

The seafront offers three kilometres of fine sandy beaches and clear waters, ideal for a refreshing swim in the Mediterranean. The historic centre's narrow streets convey authenticity, while the church of Sant Bartomeu features Catalan modernist details by architect Josep Maria Jujol, a disciple of Antoni Gaudí.

Roda de Berà offers a harmonious blend of nature and sea: along the coastal path and various marked trails, Mediterranean forests give way to panoramic viewpoints revealing breathtaking vistas of the Costa Daurada. The village of Roc de Sant Gaietà is a true Mediterranean fishing community.

Did you know...?

The Arc de Berà was erected at the end of the 1st century BC as a tribute to Emperor Augustus by order of Lucius Licinius Sura.

The local cuisine is a true treasure, with restaurants serving dishes made with the freshest products from the sea and land. Outdoor seating overlooking the sea invites you to take in breathtaking views while dining.



El Vendrell

The crossroads of history and the Mediterranean
on the Costa Daurada

Located in the north of the Costa Daurada, El Vendrell blends the best of the sea with the best of the land. The surrounding area is renowned for its winemaking tradition as part of the DO Penedès. El Vendrell also offers seven kilometres of Mediterranean beaches along the coast, inviting visitors to unwind and enjoy a variety of water sports.

Its coastline includes two nature reserves: Les Madrigueres, a wetland of remarkable ecological variety, and the Masia Blanca Marine Reserve, opposite the beaches of Coma-ruga and El Francàs, offering a wide range of experiences and a spectacular seabed. The hot springs known as the Riuet bubble up at Coma-ruga, offering mineral-rich waters renowned for their soothing and revitalizing properties.

El Vendrell is also home to a wealth of culture: the Museu Pau Casals, which was the renowned cellist's summer home by the sea, offers insight into his life and work. El Vendrell also features the Museu Deu and the museum in the Tabaris Centre showcasing the town's artistic and historical heritage.



Let the good times roll!

El Vendrell is home to *xató*, a traditional Catalan salad, as well as a vibrant cultural tradition of *castells* (human towers), *diables* (devil dances), *bastoners* (stick dancers), and *bestiari de foc* (fire beasts), all integral parts of its local festivities.

Did you know...?

Exploring the network of historic trails connecting El Vendrell with neighbouring towns is a perfect way to discover the northern Costa Daurada on foot or by bicycle.

Calafell

The Mediterranean and heritage in the heart of the Costa Daurada

Calafell perfectly combines history and heritage with a stunning coastline. With over five kilometres of sandy beaches with shallow waters, it is perfect for families, swimmers and fans of water sports. The beaches are accessible, safe, and recognized for their quality with distinctions like the Blue Flag.

The Iberian citadel is a remarkable piece of heritage that offers a glimpse into Iberian life over 2,000 years ago through family-oriented activities. In the old town, the Castell de la Santa Creu, a well-preserved mediaeval fortress, offers visitors stunning views of the Costa Daurada. Other key sites include the church of Sant Miquel, the Cases d'Indians (the grand homes of Catalans who made their fortunes in the Americas and returned home), the Museu Casa Barral, and the Calafell Pescador Interpretive Centre.

Exploring Calafell by bicycle is a unique experience, with routes along the coast and through vineyards, farmhouses and natural scenery.

Did you know...?

Calafell's cuisine reflects its maritime roots. *Arrossejat*, an iconic seafood dish, stands out as a local speciality served in many restaurants alongside a variety of other fresh seafood dishes.

Four symbolic sculptures created by Fina Olivé and located on the Passeig Marítim de Sant Joan de Déu are based on the history and culture of Calafell.



Cunit

A natural balcony overlooking the Costa Daurada

Cunit stretches out like a vast Mediterranean balcony facing the sea. Its nearly three kilometre promenade invites you to stroll, cycle, or skate in an idyllic setting—a living postcard of the Costa Daurada.

Its beaches, shaped by seven breakwaters that create crescent-shaped coves, are perfect for families. Golden sand and shallow waters invite you to play and relax.

Inland, the Puig de la Tiula mountain range offers walking and cycling routes, while the Masies route blends nature, history and heritage along rural paths that link vineyards, farmhouses and hilltops with stunning panoramic views. The Carrerada de Santa Coloma is an old livestock route that now offers a unique journey through nature and tradition.

For history lovers, Cunit offers Palaeolithic remains at the Cova de Sant Antoni, Iberian remains at the Fondo d'en Roig, the Romanesque church in the old town and various traditional farmhouses that reflect the municipality's agricultural origins.

Did you know...?

Cunit organizes outings such as the Mediterranean E-bike, an experience for all levels that allows you to discover hidden corners of the Costa Dorada on two wheels.

Cunit's cuisine blends tradition and innovation from the sea as well as the land. Xató, a traditional Catalan salad sauce, holds a special place, along with *garrofí*, a sweet made from carob.



Cambrils

Fishing village and culinary capital of the Costa Daurada

Cambrils is synonymous with good food, the sea and cycling. Cambrils, known as the culinary heart of the Costa Daurada, blends history, a maritime tradition and top-tier sporting facilities.

Its old town, with vibrant alleys and artisan shops, preserves its Mediterranean charm, while the Roman villa of La Llosa offers a glimpse into the past. Along the coast, nine easily accessible beaches with top-quality facilities invite families to enjoy a veritable seaside paradise.

Cambrils is also a hub for cycling enthusiasts, with inland routes and specialised services for cyclists of all levels.

When it comes to dining, its restaurants shine with Michelin Stars, Repsol Suns and a firm commitment to innovative, locally-sourced 'zero-kilometre (km0)' cuisine—the freshest fish from the sea and produce from the garden.

Its beaches offer calm and crystal-clear waters, while mountain trails invite you to discover unique places such as the geological formations of L'Areny and Mina de les Nines gorge, rich in history and legends related to the theme of water. Cyclists will find spectacular trails for both mountain and road riding, opening the entire Costa Daurada up to exploration.

Culture lovers can also visit a very special place, Mas Miró, the farmhouse where the painter Joan Miró drew inspiration from the surrounding landscape. Tours and activities on the property provide insight into the link between the landscape and his work.

The local cuisine rounds off the experience with authentic flavours such as the local extra virgin olive oil, carob flour and traditional Mediterranean dishes.

Fresh produce from the garden, extra virgin olive oil, *calçots* (spring onion) and carob are the star products in the kitchens of local restaurants. You owe it to yourself to discover them.
